
This term, on average, staff awarded 6 merits for every 1 demerit!




'Here to Slay' by Radhika Sanghani (Recommended Love Story / Supernatural)

Y11 Mock Exam Result Celebration - A Huge Success!



Year 10 Work Experience

Year 10 scholars recently took part in work experience week. Work experience is a huge undertaking and commitment for all involved and we are extremely proud of the scholars. We are so pleased that they fully embraced this opportunity to develop an understanding of the work environment and expectations of employers; to explore possible career options and to increase their confidence and independence. The experience also helped scholars to develop and improve key transferable employability skills such as communication, time management and teamwork. A huge thank you to all employers and to families for their support.

Scholars were asked to indicate how their work experience placement assisted the development of their personal skills and qualities.

- **91%** of scholars reported that their work experience placement enabled them to develop more awareness of the world of work.
- **89%** of scholars reported that their work experience placement enabled them to develop their communication skills.
- **86%** of scholars reported that their work experience placement enabled them to develop their independence and time management skills.

Parents were also involved in the evaluation process.

- **96%** of parents reported that their child's work experience placement enabled them to develop more awareness of the world of work.
- 96% of parents reported that their child enjoyed their work experience.

Update | Inclusion

The Intervention Hub has seen more than a hundred scholars receive 1:1 or small group interventions since its launch in January – from Zones of regulation to reading to ELSA. As well as providing a safe and calm space to talk to a keyworker when needed.

Nurture club has also proved successful and popular, where our scholars with additional needs can access their keyworkers and take part in activities, making friends and having fun in their social times.

Keyworkers are more present in lessons and are on hand to help scaffold learning for scholars that may struggle and need things breaking down a little or explaining again.

A Letter from Leicester Community Safety Partnership

Dear Parents and Guardians,

Leicestershire Police and Leicester City Council are committed to working together to address the root causes of crime and antisocial behaviour in our city. As part of this commitment, we collaborate closely with schools, community partners, and families to develop effective strategies to respond to incidents and prevent harm before it occurs.

We are reaching out to you today to seek your support in safeguarding our young people, particularly at the end of each school term, when we have observed an increase in risky behaviours among children and young people.

On December 20th, 2024, the final day of the Autumn term for most city schools, approximately 500 children and young people gathered in the city centre during the afternoon. This appears to have been a coordinated activity arranged via social media. Many of the young people involved were identifiable by their school uniforms, with the majority believed to be from local secondary schools.

While similar gatherings have occurred in the past, the scale of this event was unprecedented. The levels of antisocial behaviour were deeply concerning, including significant disruption to

businesses and people visiting the city centre, damage to police vehicles, and multiple incidents occurred requiring police intervention.

These incidents included two assaults on police officers, a sexual assault on a child, a breach of the peace, and several other assaults involving young people. At one point, the situation escalated to such an extent that a police dispersal order was necessary, and over 40 officers were deployed to restore order.

We are sure you will agree that this kind of behaviour is unacceptable. Not only does it risk drawing young people into criminal activity, but it also significantly increases the likelihood of them becoming victims of crime themselves.

To prevent a recurrence of such incidents, Leicestershire Police, Leicester City Council, and school leaders across the city and county are asking for your support. Together, we can help ensure the safety and wellbeing of our young people by:

- **1. Having open conversations** with your children about the risks associated with antisocial behaviour and the potential consequences of being involved in such activities.
- **2. Noting school finishing times** on the last day of term and ensuring you know where your children are during this period.
- **3.** Encouraging participation in alternative activities. Whether organised, informal or by accessing the range of facilities across the city, please highlight the opportunities to undertake positive activities out of school.

Our children and young people are a vital part of our community, and we want to support their freedom to enjoy the city in a safe and appropriate manner. By working together, we can ensure that the events of last December are not repeated and that our young people continue to thrive in a positive and secure environment.

Thank you for your cooperation and commitment to keeping our city safe place to live, work and visit.
