



'Kisses and Croissants' by Anne-Sophie Jouhanneau



Supporting a Strong Start: Uniform and Equipment

Uniform

We ask for the support of our families in ensuring that our scholars get off to a strong start in the new term, by making sure that all scholars are equipped and ready for learning in terms of **uniform** and **equipment**.

We are very proud of our uniform and believe it contributes to the sense of belonging in our school community; we love to see our scholars wearing their uniform with pride and hope to see every scholar doing so on the first day of term. As a reminder, our uniform expectations are as follows:

- Navy suit blazer from Uniform Direct
- White shirt/blouse, tucked in at all times
- Grey suit trousers or Castle Mead kilt skirt (worn as intended and not rolled over at the waist). Scholars are permitted to wear plain grey tailored shorts during the summer months
- Castle Mead tie
- Black school shoes or all black trainers. These must be all black, including trim and logo.
- Scholar ID card, card holder and lanyards
- School jumper from Uniform Direct (optional must not be tied at the back)
- Plain black tights may be worn under a skirt
- An outdoor coat, which should be removed when indoors

For PE, scholars will now be able to wear a plain navy T-shirt as their PE top and black or navy bottoms (tracksuit bottoms, mid-thigh length shorts, or leggings). **Scholars may continue to wear their green Castle Mead branded polo shirt next year if they wish to do so**. Scholars will also be permitted to wear a navy hoodie, which is optional.

Where scholars are not in the correct uniform, parents will be contacted and sanctions issued. If you need any support with uniform, or you foresee any issues with your child's uniform ahead of the new term, please do get in touch.

Equipment:

We will be issuing **all scholars** with a stocked pencil case (including black and green pens, a highlighter, and a pencil) on the first day of term. We want our scholars to take responsibility for being equipped and ready to learn and so we will not, as a school, be replenishing this equipment throughout the year. This year, we have given out pens whenever scholars have failed to bring these to lessons, and we have reflected that this has resulted in not everyone taking personal responsibility for their own equipment. Looking ahead to the new term, all scholars must look after their stationery and take responsibility for replenishing this themselves (i.e. by purchasing new pens — we will be opening an in-school stationery store!) when a pen is lost or runs out. Failure to do so will result in a D3 and detention.

We appreciate your support in reinforcing the importance of taking personal responsibility around coming to school each day with the right tools for learning. Thank you.


Now, as we look ahead to Results Day, we are excited to see all their hard work pay off. We know how much effort they have put in, and we are confident they will be proud of what they've achieved.




CMA Junior Chef Competition


